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

And sports lovers will find some of the most passionate groups in the province in smaller towns. In fact, the hockey arena is



often the centre of activity for hockey leagues from minor to old-timer, as well as being used for home shows and other special events. Baseball, softball, soccer, lacrosse and curling leagues are also popular.

As for annual festivals and events, residents of small towns put their hearts and souls into making them special. The Santa Claus Parades in Milton and Uxbridge are exciting, as are these towns' Canada Day celebrations and fall fairs that celebrate their agricultural roots.

Another thing many of our homeowners rell us is that they are surprised at the range of amenities these towns have, including a variety of restaurants from fast food to fine dining. Shoppers also enjoy access to country boutiques in preserved heritage buildings, big-box stores and everything in between.
